

How to Use this Guide

This guide is meant to offer advice on courses to take in the first year of college in order to progress towards a degree for new students at UNC Asheville, or their advisors. Completing a degree will require completion of both the Integrative Liberal Studies (ILS) curriculum as well as major requirements set by the department you choose to declare a major in.

Please [read the general plan first](#). This has information on 100-level requirements for ILS. Then you may review the section on your intended major. Designing your first-year plan will likely consist of beginning with the recommendations under your major, and then adding any and all ILS courses that you feel comfortable taking in your first year.

Classics

- Since Classics involve study of language, the foreign language requirement in ILS is completed in the course of the Classics major. The department still recommends that majors pursue study of intermediate level German or French.
- The Classics department offers four concentrations, but basically divides their courses into Greek, Latin, and Civilization. Introductory courses are also available in Hebrew, but are not required for degrees. The concentrations are in 1, Greek & Latin (which is good for students considering graduate school); 2, Latin (which also has a teaching licensure track); 3, Greek; and finally, 4, Classical Studies, mostly made up of courses in the civilization area.
- Students who wish to study Greek must satisfy a requirement of CLAS 103: Greek I (3) and CLAS 104: Greek II (3) before taking courses that contribute to the major. Students may take a placement exam to see if they have existing competency through these courses. Likewise, students interested in Latin must satisfy or test out of CLAS 101: Latin I (3) and CLAS 102: Latin II (3).
- From that point, students take the major introductory courses CLAS 211: Intermediate Greek I (3) and/or CLAS 212: Intermediate Latin (3). CLAS 211 and CLAS 212 allow students to take higher-level language courses in Greek and Latin respectively.
- The department recommends that students take the introductory Greek and Latin courses at the same time: they are designed to reinforce each other, and not to confuse students.
- However, in the fall of 2009, students are advised to consider taking Fast-Track Latin, which would cover CLAS 101 and CLAS 102 in the fall semester, since CLAS 102 is probably not going to be offered in the spring of 2010.
- Students should continue with CLAS 212: Intermediate Latin (3) in the spring, because the department discourages students from dropping a language for a semester.
- Students may wish to delay some of their ILS requirements to their second year to avoid 18-hour semesters.
